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reasonably likely to occur, the individual or commercial entity shall give notice to the affected Nebraska resident. Notice shall be made as soon as possible and without unreasonable delay, consistent with the legitimate needs of law enforcement and consistent with any measures necessary to determine the scope of the breach and to restore the reasonable integrity of the computerized data system. There is an exception in subsection (3) on page 5. You'll find that on line 22 that, in fact, if law enforcement needs to delay the notice in order to protect their criminal investigation, we allow them that authority, but that would be the only waiver that would be granted for this notification. We also have some provisions for small companies and also very large companies where it is costly and we allow a substitute notice. You'll find the types of notice on page 2, in Section 2 of the bill. On line 7, notice means written notice, telephonic notice, electronic notice. And if in fact, starting on line 14, we are talking about a cost to a business that would exceed \$75,000 and exceeds 100,000 residents, they would be allowed to do a substitute notice which might be e-mail, a conspicuous posting of the notice on the web site of the individual or commercial entity, or notice to a major statewide media outlet. In the event of a small company, substitute notice would also add that they could notify by a paid advertisement in a local newspaper that is distributed in the geographic area in which that entity is located. Clearly, the goal here is that people are empowered. We know that these breaches occur. We hope that we can find ways to avoid them, and there is incentive in the bill because, in fact, we don't have to give notice if that data is truncated or redacted in some way that it is unreadable or unusable by other entities. So I think it's a good provision. The committee certainly endorsed the idea, and we would offer it to you for your consideration and acceptance at this time. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Redfield. You've heard the opening on the Redfield amendment, AM2160. Open for discussion on that amendment. Senator Mines.

SENATOR MINES: Thank you, Mr. President, colleagues. I'm going to stand in support of Senator Redfield's amendment, AM2160, and give you maybe a little background on how this came together.
