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out of Nebraska, and we can build a Nebraska organization here.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Well, I applaud your economic development effort here. That's a good idea. But I remain somewhat concerned about asking someone who's trying to sell a product, and at the same time that you're trying to sell them a very legitimate product that could be from a neighboring state, but say, but beware, buyer beware. And it's awfully hard to ask a retailer to do that. At the same time, I do share your concerns, and I'm not sure if the better way would be whether we allow these things to be sold in our state at all. And if you would like to respond, you can have the rest of my time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, thank you. And I...you know, I answered the question by saying it didn't make any difference, which it doesn't in one sense. But I would certainly invite any language you think makes it clearer, as a practical matter,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...for the consumer but does not distort the legal truth of the matter. And certainly, if the body should see fit to advance the amendment, I would be open to language that you might suggest, that you think would be...you couldn't make it more accurate, because I think this is accurate in a legal sense. But if you think there is some practical language that would work better than the legally most accurate language, I would be open to that, because what I'm trying to do is communicate with the public. And anything that facilitates that, that does not distort, is certainly...I'm certainly open to that. Thank you, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Beutler, there are no further lights on. You're recognized to...you beat me to my words. Senator Chambers, you may speak.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I am the oldest person here, but I still have to move with alacrity on occasion, so I have to maintain the ability to move
