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SENATOR HUDKINS: We're talking about a car situation. And if you do buy a new car or used car, you're going to have a number of papers, in your words, thrust at you. I just...I think that this should be a case of responsibility on the part of the buyer. It's just...to me, it's just like having to print a notice on your lawn mower that said, don't put your toes under the mower when it's in motion.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, do you think that notice about your lawnmower should be in your contract?

SENATOR HUDKINS: No.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, that's why it's on the mower. And when somebody is totally at risk with respect to their money, because the reserves may not be there to fulfill the contract, in my opinion, that's important enough to elevate it to a separate and more important matter.

SENATOR HUDKINS: I appreciate your comments. Thank you.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Um-hum.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Hudkins. Senator Friend, on the Beutler amendment. Senator Friend waives his time. Senator Chambers, and this will be your third time, Senator, as you know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, if a person operates a farm and is going to get farm subsidies, that person can go find written someplace what the requirements are to get that free money. And there are people in Nebraska and on the floor of this Legislature who get that free money and may be against what they call welfare, for others. But since they get farm welfare, it's all right. I think those people, who make enough money for free from the federal government, taking tax money out of my pocket, can look after their own interests. If we can do something to protect the public, that is what we ought to do. I thought, when I heard Senator Redfield presenting her amendment, she was interested in all people, because she's talking about identity theft. Maybe she
