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knew some people or had some friends, and they're the ones she was concerned about. Well, why shouldn't everybody have to be careful and not do business with any company that may suffer a security breach? And why don't we say about them, let the customer beware, and do a background check on this company and find out whether or not they're likely to have a security breach, and thereby your identity is stolen? Well, since she's talking about people who've got credit cards and do the kind of business people of her ilk do, she's concerned about them. But when it comes to giving something to people who are going to make a purchase that maybe most people will make, a vehicle, well, let them worry about it themselves. If you give too much notice, you give them so many, they won't pay attention to any of them. Well, so what? Why do we put stop signs up, if people are not going to pay attention to them? We put the sign there because this is a dangerous crossing and the public should be warned, because those of us who make these policies and decisions know it, and the driving public is not going to be able to examine every intersection in the city and determine which ones are dangerous. So the city assumes the responsibility of warning the public, and if they ignore the sign, it's on them. That's why you punish them when they ignore the sign. But you put the warning there. We have people on this floor who say, if there's a cliff, and to get from this cliff to the next piece of ground is 1,000 feet straight down, don't put a fence along the edge. Let these people have sense enough to know that if you see the land sloping downward, it could indicate that you're going to come to a drop-off and you ought to pay attention. And if you're not sure, then get down on your belly and low crawl and then when you get to the edge, look over and see that there's an abyss, then you go the other way. It would be better to build a fence, put a warning sign. And for my colleagues who think that people ought to be attentive enough and have enough time to figure these things out for themselves, when all we have to do is require the warning, they're the kinds who would not put a fence at the edge of the cliff to protect people from falling. They'd build a cemetery at the bottom so you can bury them after they have fallen. That should not be the way we work. But I'll do to this bill what will happen to those people who fall off that cliff, and I'll start drafting my motions now. Thank you, Mr. President.
