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One are the automobile dealers, and...

SENATOR BOURNE: And they're opposed to additional disclosure?

SENATOR BEUTLER: And they were opposed yesterday to the form of disclosure that I had. Is that a fair statement, Senator Mines? Yeah.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator...

SENATOR BEUTLER: And then the other parties are people who work with these kinds of service contracts and may be selling them themselves but are not automobile dealers, or may be working with automobile dealers, and they're working in many states. They want to be sure, for example, that they can follow the different requirements of the different states, without too much...diversity is not a good thing for them, Senator, as you're probably aware.

SENATOR BOURNE: Did...when the lobbyists for the car dealers came to you and said they didn't like this provision, did they say it with a straight face?

SENATOR BEUTLER: (Laugh) You know, as in so many situations, Senator, I'm not sure...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...if it's the car dealers so much as it is the car dealers trying to stay in sync with the others who are interested in protecting the system. And the car dealers want the system protected because there are tax advantages in the system for the car dealers, which I don't mind, so long as the consumer is protected.

SENATOR BOURNE: Well, I agree with you. Now what is your compromise with Senator Mines, as it relates to this disclosure?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, Senator Mines has made it so complicated, I'm not sure I can recite the compromise. (Laughter) But I basically understand it to be this: that there
