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Nebraska. So since Senator Chambers has come forward with his amendment, why, it looks like to me this is a real nice looking horse here, and I think this is the one we want to go with. It certainly brings forward what we've been trying to do to get the funding for the veterans cemeteries to get federal funding to get them built. By doing as he says, when Sarpy County, whether they raise private funds or however they go about it, they'll be able to be eligible for some general funding to help them get their grant money started, the same way as what Alliance has been working to get their own grant money and we've been having to do it with private funding. So yeah, I would support Senator Chambers' amendment. If we can get this thing through and he's got the votes to make that work, why, I applaud him for it, and I certainly will vote for it if this is what the body will agree to. The reason we went with the \$75,000, that sort of thing, why, it was a slow process. And now, by putting an amendment such as this in this bill, why, this speeds up the process, and I think we can probably get going with our veterans cemeteries across the state of Nebraska in a lot faster position than we have been. Grand Island is expecting one, and I'm sure Senator Aguilar would be pleased to note that this would help them along whenever they wanted to get started on their project. So I think this is something that will work quite well, and I want to thank Senator Chambers for bringing it forwards, and I support the amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Loudon. Further discussion on the Chambers amendment? Senator Schimek, followed by Senator Aguilar.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. Senator Chambers, I don't find anything egregiously wrong with your amendment, but I'm not sure that we want to do that. And let me try to explain, if I can. As you know, this effort was originally meant to say we wouldn't do General Funds for any of these cemeteries, and that was kind of an agreement that was struck on the floor to get everybody to go along with it in the first place. And I'm looking at Senator Wehrbein now (laugh), because he was very concerned about that issue. And not only is it the building, but it's also the maintenance that people were concerned about. Well, subsequently, this endowment fund was
