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within parentheses, I would drop the language to the end of this definition and put what amounts to an exception to the definition. That's what my amendment would do. If you have any questions, I will answer them.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bourne, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Madam President and members. I just wanted to point out that that paren., other than a public corporation, end paren., was existing language in the statute and is really...that's how the statute reads today. I will say, though, Senator Chambers, the way he has worded it is better. But when we go through and do a committee amendment like this, we tend to deal with just the subject matter and not make grammatical changes, things like that. But I just wanted to point that that was in the original statute, as it is today, not committee language. With that, I think it makes sense, it's a...cleans it up, and I will support this.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Is there further discussion on FA426? Seeing none, Senator Chambers to close on his amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Madam President, and if I didn't say it as I've intended to, this is existing language. But when a bill comes before us and I see something in the current law which I think could be tidied up, that's what I will do. And in drafting this amendment, it says strike that language and show as stricken. When the words "and show as stricken" are included--and I did include them this time; I was wondering if maybe I left them out--it means that you're striking it from the existing law. So Senator Bourne is absolutely correct. This was not language added by the committee in drafting and submitting this amendment, which I'm working from. So there having been no opposition, I will not speak further. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. The question is the adoption of FA426 to the Judiciary Committee amendment. All in favor vote aye; all opposed, nay. Have you all voted who
