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restricting this category of items, which may be embraced in the definition of life insurance corporation, to only endowments and annuities. Should there be some additional activity or items or whatever that would apply, the language of the newly drafted amendment would allow them to slip into the tent. So I'm asking that this amendment be adopted. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Beutler, you're next in line to speak.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Schimek, Senator Hudkins, if I could ask you a couple of questions. Again, I'm at that stage where I'm trying to orient myself to how a bill works.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Hudkins.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Here's my question. If you have a gift certificate or a gift card, and I'm talking about Section 2 of the bill there, on the bottom of page 2, and it says they shall be presumed abandoned unless it remains unredeemed for more than three years, and it has some business about post-sale charges. But let's say it doesn't have any post-sale finance charge provision, and let's say that four years have passed, and it contains an expiration date of five years. Is that abandoned at the end of four years?

SENATOR HUDKINS: No, because if it has five years on it, it would be all right until five years. It...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, where does it say that?

SENATOR HUDKINS: Well, you said it had an expiration date of five years. Now there is...let's see if I can find it here, hang on. There is...are you talking about, for example, a Bed Bath and Beyond gift certificate, or are you talking about a multiuse gift card? There's a difference.

SENATOR BEUTLER: No, I'm just talking about...I think I'm talking about--I may not, as I am half the time, not know what
