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SENATOR BEUTLER: So it...

SENATOR HUDKINS: ...explanation, if the card is silent, then it's presumed to have no expiration date.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So 30 years after the card is issued, it's still not abandoned property?

SENATOR HUDKINS: I'm sorry. Would you repeat that?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Let's say 30 years after the card is issued, it's still not abandoned property?

SENATOR HUDKINS: No.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Isn't there a...I mean, at some point in time, we presume people are dead, for example. Doesn't it stand to reason that at some point in time we would declare something abandoned, even if there is no expiration date?

SENATOR HUDKINS: We want these gift cards to be treated like cash. If you put \$30 in a sock drawer and forget it for three years and then you go back, it's still there. We want it so that if you put a gift card in a drawer for three years and you go back, it still has \$30 in value. Now, if you are a bonehead and lose it,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time.

SENATOR HUDKINS: ...I'm sorry, that's just like losing \$30 in cash.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senators Beutler and Hudkins. Senator Stuthman, your light is next.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Madam President and members of the body. I still have some real concerns about this, on how things are handled and how things are with gift certificates. And I
