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where Senator Landis will administer appropriate punishment to me, or whether he's entering the confessional booth to acknowledge the error of his ways to me. But anyway, I can let my time continue to run. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I will let Senator Landis speak for himself in response to this question. Senator Landis, will you accept this amendment?

SENATOR LANDIS: I will.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: I'll accept this amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And with the acceptance by Senator Landis of this amendment, I'm going to not express any additional opposition, even though Senator Landis knows that these types of approaches I generally don't favor. But since he is willing to meet me halfway, I'm willing to meet him 95 percent of the way, because that's what's happening here. But I think it's worth it overall. So I will ask that we adopt this amendment at this point. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on FA436. Senator Landis, your light was on. Did...you may speak.

SENATOR LANDIS: I'll leave my light on. I think I can live with this language. There is a place where I can conceive of hypotheticals in which it seems to me that we'd use the language that I had in originally. You could have a private hospital that had a chapel, for example. It wouldn't be primarily for the purpose of devotion or whatever, but in...it would be a small piece of the pie. However, the most...even though I can conceive of those hypotheticals, the place where we have been concerned are places like the Lincoln Action Program, the Red Cross, places where there were buildings that could have been built cheaper and at lower cost to the ultimate nonprofit organization had we had this tool. And I'll take the part of the loaf, whatever percentage it is, that's available by accepting the amendment. I'll accept the amendment and ask for,
