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these things to your attention, then we can work our way through them so that on a matter such as this we won't just cobble together language that may not really be the best that we can do. But I do want to call that to your attention, so I hope you'll make note of it. And since this is your area, I don't have to really ask you now about that other language I mentioned, about the check...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...or draft.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler, you're recognized, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, Senator Flood, I can't remember from the debate on General File whether the language on page 13 having to do with uniformed military personnel driving vehicles is yours or somebody else's. Whose...Senator Langemeier, was that your language? Could we have a little dialogue, please?

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Langemeier, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Just one thing I wanted to check on quickly. It basically says that all of these provisions that generally apply with regard to driving vehicles in Nebraska do not apply...says, "shall not apply to uniformed military personnel operating military vehicles." Then it goes on to describe who those personnel are, and whether they're in active or in active services. It never does say anywhere uniformed military personnel with a valid military license. But isn't that what this is about? I mean, don't they have to...I don't understand the process, but don't they have to get a military license to drive, then?

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: They do. And this way, it's a duplication between the CDL, Nebraska CDL, and the military driver's
