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other states and recognize a military license.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, there wouldn't be any reason to stop a vehicle that's marked as a military vehicle, which is properly licensed. It has a government license plate. Why would the vehicle even be stopped by law enforcement anyway, if the driver were not violating a law?

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: I can't speak for the reasons that our law enforcement may stop a vehicle, whether it's an accident, whether it's violating some other particular law in Nebraska. But then they would be...at that point in time, they would have to demonstrate they have an active military license.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if they don't have...if we don't pass this provision and they do not have the Nebraska license that would be required ordinarily, what happens to that uniformed military person?

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: Right now, you fall under Nebraska law and the same penalty...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: ...that if I went and drove a semi in Nebraska without a CDL license.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what would that be?

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: I don't know the full extent of the prosecution on that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if you don't have such a license, it couldn't be suspended, revoked or whatever.

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: I think Nebraska has ample laws on the books for driving with a suspended license in those type of driver's license penalties across the whole state of Nebraska.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if you never had such a license, it could not have been suspended. So they couldn't get you for driving
