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director has no power over anybody in the State Patrol. State Patrol officers are subject to the direction of the superintendent of the department of public safety, or the superintendent of the State Patrol. But to continue: direct an officer of the Nebraska State Patrol to secure possession thereof and to return the same to the department, period. I have a problem with granting the director of the Department of Motor Vehicles authority over a member of the State Patrol. First of all, is the director going to just pick up the phone and say, I want to speak to an officer of the State Patrol, and the person says, I'm an officer of the State Patrol; well, get over here, I've got an errand for you to run? Does the director have that authority now? I don't believe so. We're not talking about a crime. We're not talking about a crime. This officer is not being sent to arrest anybody. A cop cannot go on somebody's property and take property. There's no arrest warrant. There's no search warrant. There is no court order. There is no levy, no replevin action, nothing. A cop just walks up and says, I'm going to take this document from you and I'm going to take license plates off your car, and there is nothing this cop can show that justifies this being done but he or she wears a uniform and is armed, and that's not the way laws should be enforced. And I don't see anything in the law which authorizes a State Patrol officer or any other cop to just go where he or she has not observed any violation of the law, and there is no court order, and just start taking things from people on their own property. I'll go to the next sentence: "The officer shall make every reasonable effort to secure the registration certificate and license plates and return them to the department." I don't know what they're talking about when they say "every reasonable effort," especially when it relates to a directive to a cop. We're not talking about the Omaha police. We're not talking about the Lincoln police. We're not talking about the local cop or a county sheriff in any city, village, or county in this state. But in this instance, a cop is a cop, is a cop, in the same way that a rose is a rose, is a rose. You are saying that a person who wears the uniform of the state is empowered and authorized by the state to utilize lethal force, who is authorized to take people to jail, to go on somebody's property without that person having been found guilty of anything by a court of law, without a court order having been
