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enforcement division, State Patrol could go ahead and begin looking for this person, assuming they're still on the road, and if not, they're going to know where that truck probably is anyway. So with that, I will oppose Senator Chambers' amendment as it's drawn and agree to work with him here, if we can, try and get this worked out. Thank you, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I had explained to Senator Flood, and I don't know if I had a chance to make it clear to Senator Baker, I drafted my amendment in the way that I did so that the entire subdivision where these problems exist would be spotlighted by saying eliminate all of these lines. Senator Baker has expressed a willingness to work our way through this, as has Senator Flood, so eventually I'm going to withdraw this amendment, but I want some things in the record so it's clear what my objections are. And if there are others who may have had similar objections but were not in a position to express them here, they will be aware of the fact that we're going to work our way through some of these things and try to come up with a piece of legislation that accomplishes the mandate, whatever it may be, of the federal government, while at the same time not putting law enforcement people in a position to do things in a manner that I do not think would be in the best interest, not only of the citizen but law enforcement itself. And while I'm on that, talking about the way things ought to be done legally, I had talked about a lunkhead judge named Steven Burns the other day and the problems he has created with reference to this grand jury issue involving David Hergert. People may be aware that the Attorney General did include a lot of information in a filing with the Nebraska Supreme Court, which "Kangaroo" Burns had said must be kept secret, and there was to be a hearing today, February 10, that was to be secret. The Attorney General filed his papers yesterday afternoon, late afternoon or early evening, and the Supreme Court last night told Burns, Burns, get in here, so Burns came shuffling in.
