SENATOR CUDABACK: You may. This will be your third time, as you know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. I'm going to read that sentence: Consequently, any arguments that will be made which might impact the grand jury, should this court grant the motion, will not further adversely impact the grand jury. He says, leaving out the surplusage, any arguments that will be made which might impact the grand jury will not further adversely impact the grand jury. He says, in the first part of the sentence, any arguments that will impact the grand jury will not impact the grand jury adversely. Let me continue: Therefore, the hearing on the motion to reconsider should be open to the public. That's what I said the first day I came here explaining the whole scenario. I ought to be a judge. But if the standard that "Kangaroo" Burns has set is the standard for a judge, I have to say it's beneath me. Let me continue: The order of February 1, 2006, is modified to the extent that it does not apply to the hearing to be considered on the motion to reconsider or amend the order of February 3, 2006. That's what "Kangaroo" had to do, and he has made a mess of this whole thing. I did hand out some pages from a memo I had written on the Hergert affair in August of last year, and I doubt that any senator, maybe one or two, read it. But now that the issue has been joined as to whether or not the agreement between Hergert and the Accountability and Disclosure Commission would prevent the Attorney General from filing criminal charges is out there, people may read those pages, and again they may not. I take seriously what we do as a Legislature. I take seriously those issues which involve the public interest and the public order, and I believe the courts should be open. I believe judges should behave in a very responsible, professional, ethical manner, and "Kangaroo" has failed in every respect. Maybe that's why he feels such an affinity with "Hergert the Horrible." Hergert violated laws and he's still sitting on the Board of Regents, so here's "Kangaroo." He said, hey, soul brother. And Hergert's lawyer say, well, your soul brother is not here, but I represent him. So "Kangaroo" says, what can I do for you? He says, well, Judge, I'll write it out for you and you just take it and sign your name to it. "Kangaroo" said, you
