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one who sought love in all the wrong places, they're seeking it in all the wrong places, in all the wrong ways, and that's why so many of them are so easily victimized. They know that some of these men, young and old, are lying to them, but they are so hungry to hear the words that are spoken, even though you know they're lies. Somebody is looking at her and saying these words to her, and she is so hungry for the words that she goes along with the program and suffers the consequences. And a society, instead of being supportive, showing the understanding that we all have, whether we want to admit it or not, will cast these women aside, ostracize them, and treat them like pariahs, and I'm talking about when they become pregnant. There are some who wanted to complete school even though they had made that blunder, and the school people say, no, we can't have that; you're a bad example to these other girls. And the other girls snicker because they did the same thing. They just were smart enough to use...take some precautions, because they didn't have one of these parents who said, I'm teaching you abstinence and you better not use any birth control. So the one who followed the rules, that greater rule, didn't use birth control, and she got pregnant. The others, doing some of everything, use birth control so they're not pregnant. So the ones who got away with it, so to speak, are elevated over those who didn't. Then they hear old people saying, don't use contraceptives, don't use that. I tell people don't play with fire, but if you are going to play with it, wear some asbestos gloves. I'm not going to say, since you won't listen to reason you ought to go out there and get burned. Why am I taking this time this morning?

SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

But right now I care more about women than I care about the rest of you all.
