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SENATOR CHAMBERS: So Nebraska's law is tied into what was put together by, in effect, the polluters; isn't that true, if we do away with...

SENATOR SCHROCK: I would like to think it's more in depth than that, Senator Chambers. It's by those who are...those who have the plants are trying to work with the people in our Clean Air...

SENATOR CUDABACK: It's now your time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: We can continue. We're now on my time,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may continue.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...rather than yours.

SENATOR SCHROCK: I would surmise that this is a team effort. They're trying to work with people who are trying to clean up our air. I don't think our...in this case we're talking mainly our public power districts. There are other people that burn coal in this state besides public power, but mainly the public power (inaudible) and districts. So we're trying to bring things down.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what we're looking at in Nebraska...first of all, is all the polluting...is all of the pollution that exists in the environment in Nebraska caused by polluters in Nebraska?

SENATOR SCHROCK: No, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. So we have to look at this in the national as well as the global context that you were bringing up earlier?

SENATOR SCHROCK: You're correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Pollutants that are produced in Nebraska do not remain in Nebraska only; isn't that true?
