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SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Have I spoken three times?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You have, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock, it's your time now, and you have also.

SENATOR SCHROCK: And Senator Chambers, I will continue this on my time. A lot of times, you know, they'll do a shutdown for a period of time. They try and do it the time of year when electricity demand isn't real great. And they'll do that, say, in the spring or the fall of the year. In the winter, they have the heating demand; in the summer they have the air conditioning and irrigation demand. So they'll shut down, and a lot of times they're installing new equipment which reduces emissions. And so, I think we're going to see our older plants continue to be updated, especially with this program. It does allow them to buy some time. In the meantime, your electricity is still on. I can still irrigate. Your air conditioner still works. The heating still works. And so, if you'd like to respond to that, that's fine.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now I won't take all your time, Senator Schrock, and I appreciate the opportunity. What this bill basically does is maintain status quo, but added to what is being looked at now, is mercury emitting; is that true?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, and I wouldn't even think about trying to do anything to this bill to change the program that exists now, and I did understand from the beginning that mercury was what is involved with this bill.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.
