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matter of choice, but he doesn't want me to take that out of the law as a special protected class. Marital status is a matter of choice. He doesn't want that taken out, and they're a special protected class. But when it comes to people who terrify certain individuals, superstition, hatred, intolerance will carry the day. And pride...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...is expressed by Nebraskans who hold to these hateful practices, incorporate them into the law, and do not believe that the law should embrace everybody. Some people care about fetuses, zygotes, embryos, more than they do living human beings. Why, they want to pass a law to make it a crime to do bodily injury to a zygote, which has no body. But they don't want to protect people from discrimination in employment, housing, and all the other areas where our nondiscrimination laws protect people, if they have an orientation that those intolerant people don't like. Let them get their noses out of people's crotches. What difference does it make to Senator Foley or anybody else who some adult goes to bed with or gets in the back seat of a car with or does anything of a sexual nature with?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What did you say?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I said time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Further discussion. Senator Cornett, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CORNETT: Senator Chambers, on a lighter note, Senator Connealy told me to tell you debating with you is like hunting with Dick Cheney. (Laughter) Anyway, moving on to answer some of your questions, you said you hadn't been shown a need here, or that these people would retire here because of this legislation.
