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I'm just now seeing this amendment, and it's probably been on the gadget, but the types of bills that we've been looking at today were not of the type that would make me look at the gadget. But I need to start doing that. Senator Schrock, the thing that caught my attention during your explanation leads me to ask you a question or two. So are you willing to respond?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock, would...?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Certainly, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schrock, on page 3 is the material related to the public hearing? And if I understood you correctly, currently, before one of these actions mentioned in the bill is undertaken, there must be a public hearing. Is that correct or incorrect?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That is incorrect.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Can you tell me the way the situation works now?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Hang on a minute here. We're not tracking, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's all right. I'm not in a hurry.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Chambers,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...the bill...I don't know if we're tracking. The bill says that if minor modifications or corrections are needed to be taken, then they don't have to have a public hearing.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Here's what I'm asking.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Without this, would a public hearing be
