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SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock, would you yield?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Chambers, would you like me to pull the amendment?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, Senator Schrock, it's up to you to do whatever you want to do. I'm just staking out my position on it.

SENATOR SCHROCK: I understand. It's a very minor modification, and it...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...you know, if...we can continue to have the hearings, if that's what the public wants. I'm not sure that's what the public wants. But if we want that opportunity to be there, then I can pull the amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm...as long as it's before us, I'm going to discuss it. And I'm not telling you that I cannot see any form that it would take. But when it does away with the public hearing, I will not support that at this point. And I have not been told anything that would make me feel that the hearing should be done away with, especially when the language does not guarantee a hearing, even though it says, after you get this public notice, there will be opportunity for a hearing. I don't think that language ensures that after the notice, the hearing will occur. I've accepted what Senator Schrock told us about there being language in the present law governing what public notice means. Now,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers. Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, Mr. President. I would ask that you would pull the amendment, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The amendment is withdrawn.
