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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and if I can stop it here, I'm going to. These other companies who got the giveaways have to supply or create so many jobs at an expenditure of so much money. And here comes a company, which boasts about how many plants it has all over the country, so it's making plenty of money, saying that the Legislature should give them enough money to put in equipment so that they can make additional money and pretend that they're doing the state a favor. If somebody asked me what I would do about the tires as a means to perhaps get me to not oppose this bill, I'd tell them I don't have to have any notion about what to do with the tires; I just know that this is a bad plan, it's a bad idea, and I don't operate that way. If all those tires are being stacked up in the places where they're being stacked up and they provide a basis for fuel,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...let Ash Grove deal with that. But I'm opposed to this amendment and if it's attached to the bill, I will oppose the bill.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion? Senator Schrock, followed by Senator Baker and others.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. Speaker, you can...or, Mr. President, you can pass over me for now.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members. I...just going to add a little bit of, I hope, perspective to this discussion. I have a bit of a science background, but I had to go look up a nanogram. What we're talking about, we're stressing the negatives in this handout that both Senator Schrock and Senator Preister handed out. I'll talk about the negatives for a bit, very little. PCBs, the polychlorinated biphenyls, we're talking down here at the bottom, if you look at that, dioxins and those are measured in nanograms per dry
