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SENATOR CORNETT: I agree with you that the insertion of a date, so we know what the standard was if the...if that changes at some time, is a good idea.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Suppose I would offer such an amendment?

SENATOR CORNETT: I would be happy to accept that amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All "righty." (Laughter)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, are you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, how much time do I have?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You have about 2.04.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And I will keep talking while we wait for this amendment to get up on the desk. You know what this is like? I don't want Senator...I don't want Senator Cornett to misunderstand this that I'm doing. Senator Cornett, have you ever lived on a farm?

SENATOR CORNETT: I haven't lived on a farm, but I did work on farms.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When they take cattle to feedlots, they feed them a lot of food.

SENATOR CORNETT: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why do they feed them?

SENATOR CORNETT: To get them nice and fat to slaughter them.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. (Laughter) So what appears to be benevolence may not really be that, correct?

SENATOR CORNETT: No, it kind of sounds like you're leading me to slaughter.
