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expenditures. I don't know what all the business is about whether the funds are in the proper place. You can argue that the funds should go someplace else, that they shouldn't be in this fund. But the Accountability Commission has an opinion out that says, we think they can go to this fund. But I don't know that anybody is particularly worried about Lancaster County. This has nothing to do with Lancaster County. It does have to do with putting some funds of one type or another to this purpose. And I would submit to you that this is a great purpose, especially considering how little of the money we've spent. If you divide the money we've actually spent by the number of races, it comes out to \$500 a race or so. Boy, that's a bargain. Fair elections for \$500 a race. So I've said those things in response to arguments made, and I will keep responding, but there is some other material I'd like to go over with you when the proper time comes, maybe talking about, if people are interested, some of those anomalies that have occurred. There have been two or three anomalies, out of 150 races. But we should talk about them, so everybody has the same understanding of what they meant and how they happened. Brad Kuiper, I don't know what was going on with his...in his mind in that Treasurer's race. But I can tell you this, all he had to do was reduce the amount on his final affidavit when he filed it by \$120,000 and nobody would have gotten any money. The result was, \$120,000 was spent against his interest, because he made a fatal mistake. Things like that were...at the beginning of the operation of a law, when people don't understand the law, can happen. And I'm sorry that happened. But that doesn't mean the overall law is bad, because people are not going to act against their own interest whenever they can figure it out, that's for sure. So we can talk about some of these other situations, too. The Regents races are interesting to talk about, because I think there's clearly a calculated pattern there...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...that's designed to beat the Campaign Limitation Finance Act. And we can talk about that pattern as time passes. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Erdman,
