incumbent has an advantage because of the support that they have gained throughout the years that they have been serving in the Legislature. They gained support from the organizations. They will contribute to their campaign of the incumbent. I wasn't very fortunate to have any of that. I raised very little money. Matter of fact, I started out with hardly anything. I didn't have a committee; I didn't have a group. I did it myself and my family, just worked hard on it and put up a few signs and worked on that angle of it. The thing that people are very interested in is who is really behind you to run for the office. Who is supporting you with money? Who are the people that are really funding you, and want to get their personal agenda addressed while you're in office? I really had no one that was pushing me; no one was realistically supporting me, except my family, people in the community. But I think it comes down to, you know, it's what you stand for and what you are as an individual. I will give you a little bit of an update as to how many dollars was it involved in my race, and Senator Beutler, you know, knows it, because he is very much familiar with the campaign finance issues and the dollars amount raised. I think my campaign, I raised or...in the area of four, five, six thousand dollars, is what it took to run my campaign. My campaign only included a few radio announcements, very few signs, posters, and I don't know if I even did a mailing. I may have, don't remember that far back. But my opponent, an incumbent, which had been in the Legislature for quite a number of years, had raised between fifty and fifty-five thousand dollars, you know, to run the campaign. So you know, there was a real issue of the dollar amount that was spent on her campaign, and she did a real...a good job of campaigning. But in the end, you know, I was elected, and I'm very proud, you know, to be down here, and that the people have supported me down here. I think the issue of the fact that Senator Kruse said that he would not be here, you know, if it wasn't for the Campaign Finance Act, that he could get some money to help support it. And I realize in different areas it is a lot different, as to how much money it takes to influence and get the information out to the people in your district that are going to vote for you. But I don't know whether we should change it. I fear that if we raise these limits, the fact that people that don't have the resources are not...are going to feel that, you know, they would really like
