candidate, but spending on those who would support that candidate. I would support a cap that said that an individual may be able to give, what is the number? The federal race is, I think it's \$2,000 each election cycle, \$4,000 total, I believe. Maybe cap the political action committees to a \$5,000, or some number per candidate. Looking at corporate contributions, you can give corporate contributions in the state of Nebraska. If some company in Omaha wanted to give money to a candidate in western Nebraska, they can do that. It just has to be disclosed. They don't have to have a PAC in order to meet our law. Those are things that would probably do more to benefit the process of disclosure, but here's the ultimate one that I think would make the most sense, and Senator Friend also alluded to this: How is it that we can go through this process on the floor of the Legislature, and we can have an amendment drafted, it can be posted on the Unicameral...or, the Internet in a real-time manner for us, and we can go through that process and see it, and within minutes, I'm sure it's out there on the Internet, from what happens here to what happens there. I agree with Senator Friend. If somebody wants to give me \$20, which is what generally my campaign was, was a bunch of people giving me \$10 and \$20 to get to that number that I mentioned earlier, disclose them all. Do it in a reasonable time frame, couple days, couple...whatever. But do it in a time frame so that people know. Full disclosure is fine with me. You could, theoretically, have a bunch of \$250 checks be sent to a candidate in the state of Nebraska and come up with a large sum of money, and nobody would have any way of knowing where that money came from, unless the candidate voluntarily disclosed that. That's the threshold now, and that threshold is probably a reasonable threshold. Does repealing this law solve that? No, it doesn't, and I think there have been legislation introduced to the Government Committee that addressed the hard cap. I think Senator Smith had that. I think there is also a goal that we should all have in encouraging the Accountability and Disclosure to come up with some form of electronic filing or something that's an alternative, and I'm not...
