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triggering fair fight funds.

SENATOR FOLEY: So there's one more reporting cycle built into the...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Into a nonabider's side.

SENATOR FOLEY: ...into the amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah.

SENATOR FOLEY: I see. I didn't realize that. I'll have to take a closer look at that. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Foley. Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the body. I do also appreciate the high level of debate that we have had this morning. I believe the key to the Campaign Finance Limitation Act is that campaign spending is still voluntary. Candidates can choose to exceed the spending limits, and if they do, then their opponent does receive some funds. I believe that the act does help to avoid some of the excessive financial excesses that can actually distort the election process. Is this perfect? No. But I am going to continue to support the act. I do not believe that now is the time to do away with it. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brashear, there are no further lights on, so at this time it will not be necessary. Thank you. Senator Beutler, you're recognized to close on your AM2270.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, thank you for paying so much attention to the debate. I think it's been a very good debate, in the sense of all the different factors and considerations that have been put out there. Let me just reiterate what I hope you will look at. Before campaign
