SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Kremer. You've heard the closing on the Agriculture Committee amendments, presented by Chairman Kremer. The question before the body is, shall those amendments be adopted? All in favor vote aye; opposed, nay. Voting on adoption of the committee amendments. Have you all voted on the committee amendments who care to? Record please, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of committee amendments.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Committee amendments have been adopted.

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

On page 1, in line 23, I would strike, beginning with the second appearance of the word "eggs"--and in my amendment I may not have put the second appearance of the word "eggs," because it appears twice--I would strike, beginning with the second appearance of the word "eggs," the rest of the language on that line, and I would insert "an unborn chick." Then at the top of page 2, I would strike all language from the first line. And this is what you would have: "Hatching eggs means an unborn chick." I think
