word...the words "unborn child" and substitute "zygote, embryo, or fetus," where appropriate? Are you willing to do that?

SENATOR KREMER: I would have to make that decision when it...when it becomes appropriate time, but I doubt it, but then...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You can see an inconsistency here, though, can't you?

SENATOR KREMER: In a way, but I also think there's a difference between animals and humans.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, all animals are...not all animals are human, but all humans are animals.

SENATOR KREMER: (Laugh) Well, maybe not all, but then maybe some. (Laughter)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All humans are animals. The word "animal" is not bad. It is not pejorative. It depends on the use made of it. Just like the word "good" can have opposite meanings, "bad" can have opposite meanings. You can say he's a bad boy. You can see a vehicle that you like and say, that's a bad vehicle--same word, opposite meanings. But you understand very clearly what it is that I'm talking about this morning, don't you? The point that I'm making...

SENATOR KREMER: Yes, I understand...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...by pointing out that one of these fowls, which is at a stage of development, which does...has not reached the point of the critter being a full-fledged fowl, being called an unborn or unhatched whatever the creature is. That would parallel your and others' position that a zygote, an embryo, or a fetus is an unborn child. What I'm doing would parallel what you all do in that regard. Isn't that true, if you can bring yourself to just acknowledge what is obvious?

SENATOR KREMER: Are you asking me the question?
