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SENATOR KREMER: If I said that, I misspoke, I'm sorry, but I thought that I said that the definition down here on 23 was used in the original statutes on line 11, and that's stricken and applied later. But the definition definitely would be only one place, but the (inaudible) later.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, good. Then that extra language that I put up there about correlating does not have to be considered.

SENATOR KREMER: I think that's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The important thing is that a definition is provided for the term "unborn" in my amendment, and I'm accepting Senator Hudkins' instruction this morning. The definition would be changed only, and when I say the definition, I mean the first part of my amendment, not by trying, through subterfuge or trickery, to change the word "chick" to "fowl," which would be accurate, and I know that's not something the Legislature may be famous for, but it would simply provide a definition for the word "unborn." Now, if you agree with what Senator Hudkins said, then the term "unborn" should apply to the status of development or the phase of development of those critters that the amendment addresses. Since all of them would be hatched, rather than born, the word "unborn" needs to be defined. That's what this amendment before you would do. It defines "unborn" as "unhatched," and that's what is before you. I can't understand why there's so much discomfort among my colleagues, who argued so vociferously with me about insisting that a zygote, an embryo, a fetus is an unborn child. They want that in the statute every place they can get it. But to show how I will say inconsistent, not hypocritical, how religion-oriented they are, they do not want to treat others of God's creatures--because they say they believe in God and that's where all their views come from--the same way. Even my friend Senator Friend did not want to vote with me to use an accurate term in my amendment. And I heard him back there getting advice from the peanut gallery, because he had voted correctly first. He had voted green, Then, after I heard his deep smoky voice back there, then I started listening to what the words were that were being articulated, and he said something about, well, I
