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attributed to just flat-out (laugh) ignorance, okay? Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Friend. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, that one time the peanut gallery really hit the nail on the head, and the head decided, rather than repeating that, he would rely on his own judgment and mitigate the damage that would have been done, had he accepted the suggestion from the peanut gallery. I'm glad to see him exercising that kind of independence, but I wish he would exercise it in other situations, too. I'd like to ask Senator Friend a question.

SENATOR SCHIMEK PRESIDING

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Friend, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Presto! Chango! Presto!

SENATOR FRIEND: That's...that would be true.
