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the Legislature goes down the drain? They're not here long enough for it to mean anything to them, and they don't even understand enough for it to mean anything to them. There are issues that can be presented to them out of context, and they'll be so flattered that a big corporation comes to them and says, I want to work with you. They're flattered. So what can I do to please this corporation and run home and tell people that Monsanto or some other one came to me? The corporation tells them what to do, and that is what they do. They just don't know. A lot of damage they do is going to be from ignorance, but it will be what is called vincible ignorance; it can be corrected if a person takes the time to do so. Invincible ignorance is that ignorance which cannot be overcome, and I'd hate to think that anybody who winds up in the Legislature will be subject to invincible ignorance. It's going to take them time to even understand who the players are, and they're not going to put in the time. Not everybody who's been around here a long time puts in the time necessary to really do the job. But there are enough others who do understand, who are aware of the contexts in which certain things occur, to overcome that. And when I say "that," I'm talking about the apathy of those who are here and should know better, whether they do or not, and consequently, should do better. The public this time is going to get what they asked for. They're going to get a legislature which is going to let all kinds of crazy things fly across the floor into law. Corporations take the long view. They'll just wait me out.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They may have two years. They can sit back and wait, because they know then they've got an open field to do everything and get everything they want. Look what happens while I'm here when I try to reason with other senators who are here, who will actually come to me and say, I'm doing such and such because I like so and so, and I know the bill is no good. So it befalls me to do the hard work that others would participate in, if they would follow what they have told me their own conscience tells them they ought to do. But they'll admit that they're very glad that I will do it; otherwise, it would not be done. So when I get on my hobbyhorse and talk
