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SENATOR BAKER: Yes, it does.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, that's not from Washington, D.C., is it?

SENATOR BAKER: Well, I think the headquarters for Department of Transportation is in Washington, D.C., and I think this is simply a liaison through that...for that Washington office.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, this letter, then, is an interpretation by Diane Podany. Who is that? How do you pronounce her last name?

SENATOR BAKER: You're doing as good a job at it as I could, Senator. I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR BAKER: Diane Podany, I believe.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And it looks like it's spelled P-o-d-a-n-y.

SENATOR BAKER: Yes. Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Stuthman said "Po-donnie," as though it's P-o-d-o-n-n-i-e, "Po-donnie," and he's sitting here smiling. I don't know if he's given me a bum steer and got me to swallow hook, line, and sinker. But nevertheless, I wanted to give the way it seems to be pronounced by him. Senator Baker, this letter apparently is an interpretation by the one who signed it, Diane Podany. Correct?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is she a lawyer, do you know?

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Chambers, I don't know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What are her credentials, other than that she signed this letter for Ms. Mueller, or "Muller," or however she pronounce (sic) her name.
