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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And without that vote, do you think you would have had the 30...first of all, how many votes does it take to suspend the rules?

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: It takes 30, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And do you think that there's a possibility that you might not have gotten to 30 without Senator Foley's vote?

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: There's always a possibility, but I live in hope.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, would you like my vote?

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: I would...I would very much like to have your vote, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Persuade me to vote the way you'd like me to vote on your time, because mine is up and I don't want to be in the middle of one of your presentations because I think when it is broken, sometimes the spell is broken. And I want to see if you can persuade me to vote to suspend the rules. Thank you,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion, suspend the rules? Senator...Speaker Brashear, there are no lights on. You're recognized to close.

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the body, I will not belabor this. I'm going to assume that maybe if I tell Senator Chambers that one of his bills is the third one down in worksheet order that he might be interested in supporting the suspension, and there are 23 bills total. And I would appreciate your support. Thank you.
