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SENATOR BYARS: ...we....that is universal knowledge that's shared between the states. Obviously, if they're asking to practice temporarily in the state of Nebraska, the background check is done by the Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Regulation and Licensure, and an appropriate decision would be made on them being able to issue orders in this state. This is very supported by all of the medical professional groups within the state of Nebraska. We...from the Nebraska Medical Association, Nebraska Hospital Association, the subgroup of practicing...

SENATOR SMITH: I read the committee statement. I'm familiar with that.

SENATOR BYARS: Okay. I'm very confident in their recommendations.

SENATOR SMITH: Yeah, and I don't question that whatsoever. So what is the process then for notifying the public from another state in the new state if there has been a temporary revocation or otherwise?

SENATOR BYARS: I don't know that.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Further discussion? Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President. If we might continue in our dialogue with Senator Byars?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Byars.

SENATOR BYARS: Yes.

SENATOR SMITH: So you said you were unaware of the actual mechanism that takes place if there's a concern about a licensee in another state then practicing in Nebraska, effectively practicing in Nebraska through this bill? You're not aware of
