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One of the major problems they used to have with child support—and I know this for a variety of reasons, including having worked with title insurance in the past—is just figuring out whether payments are current or not. And if payments aren't current, or are shown as not current, even though they might be current, it has implications for...possible implications for the person who owes the child support, including liens on property and other implications. My question is this, and maybe I'd just ask you to take a look at it: Isn't there some language or some process connection here that should be in the bill, indicating that the information will get to the proper people to credit the account of the person being obliged, so that the records are clear? Or need we not worry about that? And I would yield you the rest of my time, but you needn't answer. I would just like to talk to you about that a little bit more, maybe.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. That's a very good question, and I do think that we have to be very careful about how we do this. It would be my supposition that the agency itself, the Treasurer's Office, would put together some rules and regulations that would mean that we wouldn't be making those kinds of mistakes, which I agree, have been made in the past. And we don't want that to happen. Does there need to be actual language in this particular bill? I...you know, I think you'd have to ask Senator Friend, but I don't necessarily think it's necessary. But it probably couldn't hurt, either. So I think with that, I would either yield you a little more time or Senator Friend, maybe, a little more time to respond, if he would like to.

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is Senator Beutler's time. Senator Beutler, did you wish to...

SENATOR BEUTLER: I would return my time to the Chair, and if Senator Friend would like to speak on it, of course I'd be grateful for that.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Further discussion? Senator Friend, did you wish to speak? You're recognized.
