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SENATOR SCHROCK: Well, they grow and they put on weight.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So they very easily could exceed 55 pounds in a week, couldn't they?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Oh, I don't know how fast pigs put on weight, but I...at some point in time, they're going to exceed 55 pounds.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And they could become very, very large...

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...if they hang around long enough and eat enough.

SENATOR SCHROCK: And what they do, what they have, Senator, they have farrowing units and finishing units. And at some point in time, they move them from the farrowing units to the finishing units, and it could be several miles away.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But it all could be at the same location, couldn't it?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, it can.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And in that case, making the cutoff at 55 pounds may not really be of that much consequence, right?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Well, they'd have to add the numbers over 55 and the numbers under 55, and combine that for their total animal units.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But the point I'm getting to, if the animals are going to weigh more than 55 pounds, then you have a certain number that you can automatically get by way of an increase,...

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...automatically.
