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SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If they weigh under 55 pounds, there would be a larger number of them, which automatically would be allowed by way of an increase.

SENATOR SCHROCK: It's true, and that's based upon the amount of waste generated from each critter.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if...how long does it say that these who weigh fewer than 55 pounds would be allowed to remain at that location?

SENATOR SCHROCK: You know, Senator Stuthman, I think, produces a little pork on his place. He could probably answer better than I could at what age in their life they become 55-pounders.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, at this point I'm not going to ask Senator Arnie "Porkchop" Stuthman a question on this. But I will get to him before we're through. In other words, Senator Schrock, your interest primarily is with the cattle and the dairy cattle, dairy cows. Is that true?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes. They're the ones facing the most amount of change.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I'd like to ask Senator Wehrbein a question, if he's here, because I can't see around this wide-bodied individual who is standing between us. (Laugh)

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute. And, Senator Wehrbein, would you respond?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) You don't have to move, Senator. He's there now. Senator Wehrbein, do you raise dairy cattle?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: We did.
