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have to do in the remaining session. I'm going to take my time on this bill, as I said I'm going to. But I also left open the door to Senator Schrock so that we can talk, because Atropos hasn't snipped the thread yet. But the scissors are in Atropos' hands,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and the scissors are poised. And there's only one things scissors can do when they're open, if they're going to do anything, and that's to close. But they have not closed yet. And, Senator Schrock, you and I are the only ones who will persevere on this issue, because it's your bill and I have an interest in it. And what is of interest to me is to watch my colleagues on matters that are of importance not have any interest in it. On their individual issue they'll have interest, and when theirs comes up they'll be wanting you to stay here and help them overcome me, in the way that they have deserted you now. But that's the way it is on everybody else's issue. But I have to be interested in all of them, and I am. I'm not convinced that people are going to be going out of business if we don't adopt this amendment that allows these...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...automatic increases in critters. Was that my third time?

SENATOR CUDABACK: It was.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you. Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Chambers, I want you to know that I think a mid-sized operation or a big operation, if they want to expand, they should go through the zoning, they should have to have approval of the zoning board, the county board, whoever is involved. I don't think a big expansion should be ignored by the county and we should take that power away from them. But I do think that if we're just trying to deal with an operation
