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be someplace in the state that is receptive to this. And we know that it's not...no longer true, let's say, roughly, along the Missouri River, for one or two tiers of counties. So I think it behooves us to look at trying to have some kind of orderly, comprehensive outlook across the state where livestock would be acceptable, and people moving in would know that that's what the parameters are.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Before I go back to Senator Schrock, I want to ask you this question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you saying...this is still with Senator Wehrbein. Are you saying, Senator Wehrbein, that it is your conviction that if this bill were enacted--remember, I'm talking now about cattle and dairy cows--that there are some operators who could stay in business who otherwise would not be able to if they had to make these modifications but were not given this automatic right to expand?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, moderate-sized especially, which is what we're talking about. Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the difference between staying in business and going out would be this expansion, in your opinion?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: It could be one of the factors. You don't want to say...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yeah, that's what I'm saying,...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: It's one of the factors, yes. I'm just saying it...not...that ought not to be the one that shuts you off when everything else fits, that you can't get to go through the process and get the answer that you need.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. And I'll go back to Senator Schrock now.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock.
