SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, these amendments are not profound, and they don't hurt the bill in any way, and I've talked to Senator Cudaback. Senator Baker mentions he's looked at them. So my presentation is not going to be lengthy, but I do believe that I should say something about the amendment for the record, so it's clear what this is and why I'm offering it. On page 1, in line 23, and page 2, in lines 7 and 22, I would strike the words "may be" and insert the word "are." What we're talking about here is a certificate of title with such assignments thereon as may be necessary to show, and so forth. It is not a matter of may be; they are necessary. There is no discretion here, because in some instances, if you do not comply with what is required, you are guilty of an offense where a penalty can be imposed. So either it is mandatory that these assignments are there, or they're not. So we would merely strike the words "may be" and insert the word "are." Senator Cudaback has stated that if he does not have a comment to make, that is expression of his approval and we can move right along. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Baker, could I follow through with you on pages 4 and 5 a little bit, to be sure I understand the intent of what you're trying to do?

SENATOR BOURNE: Senator Baker, will you yield?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, I would.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And I, too, have no objections to the bill, Senator Baker. Please understand that. At the bottom of page 4, there is the beginning of a definition of a car club, and then...and that's described as an organization of any type that has members with expertise in certain kinds of restoration and preservation and replacement skills related to specific vehicles. Then it goes on to describe recognized car clubs, as opposed to car clubs, and a recognized car club has to be a nonprofit organization with established bylaws and at least 20 members. And it indicates that you can apply to be a recognized car club, and this is important because in order to
