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SENATOR JENSEN: Well, because...I've said that as I have attended their meetings.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yeah, but these new people haven't even been to a meeting and you've never dealt with them, so how do you know they're not timid?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, I don't think that their...the boards from which they come from, their discipline, would ask them to serve if they were individuals that weren't able to speak on behalf of their discipline.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So is there anything in their submissions or were any statements made by the senators who spoke for them indicative of a lack of timidity on the part of any one or all of them?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, they...when somebody comes before our committee, we ask them for some of their background, some of their history, their interests, and certainly there's a lot that you can pick up by hearing them. We also have a...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How would...how would you know whether they're timid or not?

SENATOR JENSEN: (Laugh) Well,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That probably was an overstatement, not based on facts that you have at your disposal, right? You were just kind of giving them credit?

SENATOR JENSEN: I would...I would...yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. So there could be some timid people on this board. Is that right?

SENATOR JENSEN: There could be, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now, not being timid is not a qualification for being on the board, is it? You can be timid and be on this board, right?
