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SENATOR CHAMBERS: So when they don't follow C then they're pronounced as A, as in neighbor and weigh. So will you, from now on, pronounce those words "a-ther" and "nay-ther"?

SENATOR JENSEN: No, I don't believe I've ever used that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Will you from now on, since you've been brought up to speed?

SENATOR JENSEN: (Laugh) Well, perhaps. I know you quite often... I always say "straynth" and you say "strenth."

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You...wait a minute, which word, s-t-r-e-n-g-t-h?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. You say how...you say it how?

SENATOR JENSEN: I say "straynth."

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what do I say?

SENATOR JENSEN: (Laugh)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Quit coaching him over there.

SENATOR JENSEN: No, no, no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You're confusing him. (Laughter)

SENATOR JENSEN: Yeah, thanks, I am getting coached. You...I always notice this about you and, to tell you the truth, some other...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm glad that's what you notice about me. (Laugh)

SENATOR JENSEN: Hey.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. So how do I pronounce it?
