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SENATOR JENSEN: That is possible. It also may have been possible that when they added the public member it was at the same time and they, rather than stagger it, they put them on at the same time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But we...we're not really sure of that, right?

SENATOR JENSEN: No. No, we're not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR JENSEN: I just know that they both expire August of 2010.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I am pleased that we have two women being appointed.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator. Time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Was that my third time?

SENATOR CUDABACK: It was not. It was your second. Now is your third.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, I wouldn't feel that I was being fair to Ms. Heiden, or "Hay-den," if I didn't give her the same amount of time as had been given to the previous appointee. Senator Jensen, have you ever had a discussion of each appointee who had cleared your committee in the way that we're discussing these individually this morning?

SENATOR JENSEN: Not often. There are times where we got into much more detailed questioning.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Was it a set of circumstances where, if there were several appointees in the same report, that somebody asked that each individual appointee be discussed as I've asked that it be done this morning?

SENATOR JENSEN: That is probably true.
