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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, but...well, you know there are a lot of senators...a number of senators who have that attitude, don't you? They say that there should be no legal protection for people who are...

SENATOR JENSEN: I'm not speaking for others.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you know that anyway, don't you?

SENATOR JENSEN: That's probably true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now why would anybody condemn a family man, like this fellow from Kansas or wherever he came from, for doing things with his family in conformity with his beliefs? Does he have a right to believe the way he wants to in America?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does he have a right under the First Amendment to express his views in America?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does he have a right to have a family in America?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does he have a right to engage in family activities in America with his family?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why is he condemned, then, for taking his family around the country to engage in family activities, based on his particular beliefs? Why is he so condemned, do you think? He is condemned. Why do you think that's so?

SENATOR JENSEN: I would say public norms and acceptance.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if we use the word "norm," we mean--and
