body. I rise in support of the bill. I think that it is a good compromise. But the one thing I want to say is that this is not a bill about rewarding people for having served in our military. That's the way it started, but I will tell you that it has turned into an economic development bill and the reason for that is because, in fact, the impact on Offutt and its mission here, located in Nebraska. I've pulled out an article in the paper that was talking about some of the suppliers that have moved into Nebraska, and some have been here, some have expanded. Northrop Grumman have 750 workers and a building under construction in Bellevue. Overall, they have 125,000 employees and an annual revenue of \$26 billion worldwide. Lockheed Martin had 100 people here a year ago. Now they have 225 and they expect to top 300 within a year, but that is predicated on whether in fact they can draw the people that have this kind of security clearance. It is imperative that they are able to draw those people in order for them to meet that goal. They have 130,000 employees in 56 countries, and an annual revenue of \$31 billion. SEIC, a company out of San Diego, has been at Offutt since 1965. It now has 100 to 150 people here in Nebraska, down by Offutt, and another 60 to 75 at the Scott Technology Center. The force is expected to double within a year, again predicated upon whether or not they are able to attract the people with this kind of clearance. Overall, they have 44,000 workers in the world, with an annual revenue of \$6 billion. Computer Sciences Corporation expects to add 180 area employees under a new ten-year, \$525 million contract. In all, they have 91,000 employees and an annual revenue of \$14 billion. Raytheon, who's been in the area since 1994, has 140 employees and they plan to add 200 in the years to come; 78,000 worldwide, and annual revenue of \$18 billion. Booz-Allen Hamilton has hired 85 people since arriving in Omaha last year. They expect to add another 130 in the spring; in all, 16,000 employees worldwide and \$2.7 billion in annual revenue. Boeing employs about 60, mostly at Offutt, and they've opened a new Omaha office last year. Boeing has 156,000 employees in 70 countries, with an annual revenue of \$50 billion. BAE has been in the news lately. They have just completed a new building. The local work force there has grown by 10 to 25 percent a year, starting at Offutt in 1982. It's a British company, employs 25,000 employees in North America, and the U.S. revenues equal
