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require work experience.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But can the state tell a recipient, in order for you to remain eligible you must engage in work experience, since you can't find a job, because we want you counted?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, this is when they enter into that self-sufficiency contract that they enter into, that says that they will find work. And there are various work activities. Some of those include training; some of those include education. There's quite a list, even providing childcare services for an individual who's participating in a community service program.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. I'm not interested in those things right now. I want to focus on this. When a person enters that contract, is the person required to meet all of the conditions contained in the contract?

SENATOR BOURNE: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: When they enter into the contract, they are saying that they will participate and do whatever it takes to fulfill that contract.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does the contract specify things that the recipient is required to do?

SENATOR JENSEN: There is a list of things where they may do, and they all add up to the qualifications that would allow them to participate into the program.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If they do not comply with any of these and not one of them is mandatory, how can they be found to be in violation of a contract?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, like I said, they must participate in a...in qualifying for that contract. That contract lists a number of activities, around 12, that...they may participate in one, or they may participate in...

SENATOR BOURNE: Time.
