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SENATOR BAKER: I didn't know that, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And do you know that these children of the corn, as they were labeled, were very different children?

SENATOR BAKER: I'm not familiar with the movie, Senator Chambers, at all.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if you get a chance, watch it. They did some things that I don't think many members in this Legislature would approve of, and I don't think they would approve of their children or grandchildren playing with these children. Now, Senator Baker, you said that this is a first-time appointment, correct?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Since Mr. Dix did not have anything to say, other than that you should support her appointment, what did she say when she appeared before the committee that persuaded you that you should support her appointment, or was your mind made up based on submitted documentation, or a combination of the two?

SENATOR BAKER: It would be a combination of the two.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What did she say that particularly stuck in your mind.

SENATOR BAKER: Well, the simple fact that she drove all the way...I assume she drove, all the way from Hemingford to Lincoln to appear, when actually her senator, which is Senator Loudon, could have appeared on her behalf, said...told me right there she was committed to making meetings. I asked her that question, I believe, knowing it's a long distance from Hemingford to Lincoln. Her present occupation is a highway superintendent. I assume that that's the connection she had with Mr. Larry Dix.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you realize that your comment could be
