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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did he say why he wanted to be on this board?

SENATOR BAKER: I think he...I don't recall exactly what he said, but he has a lot to offer having been on a county board for coming on 36 or...let's see, what is it, 29 years.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Twenty-nine years.

SENATOR BAKER: Twenty-nine years, he obviously has had a lot of experience with roads and classifications and six-year road plans and so on. And I think he's simply willing to lend his expertise to a board like this.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did he say those were the things he gave his time to while he was a board member?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, and I'm...that's my assumption I guess I should say, Senator Chambers. That is typically part of the job description of being a county supervisor or county commissioner.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But since I asked you what he said that related to this board, let me not say what I asked, let me ask the question straight up. What did he say during his testimony that suggested he should be on this board other than expressing a wish to be there?

SENATOR BAKER: He relayed to us his personal experience in this field of roads classifications and standards.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What are his education credentials?

SENATOR BAKER: He graduated from North Bend High School and later University of Nebraska at Lincoln with a bachelor's of science degree in business administration now.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There is a box which he is to mark in order to make clear his political affiliation, correct?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes.
