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SENATOR HUDKINS: Yes. Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. So then what...so, again, what does this amendment do that is not currently being done?

SENATOR HUDKINS: It just says that all of this information, the original official copies, shall stay with the agencies involved, in case there are more court proceedings. Because if this paperwork is with an attorney here or someone else there, if there is further litigation, then how do you know for sure, this is my opinion, how do you know for sure if all of that information comes back?

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. But in the situation that you described before, where this agency hearing was simply recorded, the attorney personally hired a transcriber. There's nothing in this amendment that would require that attorney to turn over to the agency that transcribed document. That would be his or her property still. Isn't that correct?

SENATOR HUDKINS: The court reporter, Senator Bourne, was actually there because there was a formal request for a hearing.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. How do we do it today?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: It's simply recorded. There's no...there's no transcriber at these hearings?

SENATOR HUDKINS: If there's no request for a formal hearing, then it is recorded on videotape.

SENATOR BOURNE: It's recorded on audiotape or video?

SENATOR HUDKINS: Video.

SENATOR BOURNE: Videotape? Okay.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Audio. I'm sorry, audiotape.
